
FORMATIVE ASSESSMENT &

SESSION SCHEDULE

- First 30 Minutes: Introduction to strategies & tools
- Second 30 Minutes: Schoology Overview
- Final 30 Minutes: Exploration & Questions



SCHOOLOGY TOOLS

FORMATIVE ASSESSMENT STRATEGIES

- Exit/Admit Slips
- Learning Logs
- Textual Response
- Graphic Organizers
- Visual Representations
- Discussion
- Constructive Quizzes



EXIT & ADMIT TICKETS

- Short written responses that gauge student learning
- Beginning or end of class
- Should take only a few minutes



- 1. Create assignments or quizzes to function as exit and admit tickets.
- 2. If you'd like the whole class to see, use the discussion feature.

LEARNING LOGS

- Journal used for student reflection
- Ask students to record what they know, how they came to understand, and/or questions they have
- Schedule weekly or by unit





- 2. Ask students to respond to the unit's Essential Question(s)
- 3. Have students record their journals using the assignment feature.
- 4. To foster a sense of communal learning, use the discussion feature.

TEXTUAL RESPONSE

- Students read short excerpts or articles and respond personally and/or answer questions about the text
- Responses can be about the content or about the reading process



- 1. Use the test/quiz feature to create a series of questions that can be used with any text
- 2. Use the discussion feature, so students can compare their responses with others' responses
- 3. Make it timed and in-class to ensure students are providing their own responses

GRAPHIC ORGANIZERS

- Helps students organize thoughts and shows connections between ideas
- Endless varieties—Google or create your own
- Schoology functions as the digital storage location paperless; can never be lost; proof of completion



On an iPad, students can download to a .pdf editing app, complete, and upload back to Schoology as an assignment.

VISUAL REPRESENTATIONS

- Requires students find a nonlinguistic representation of an idea
- Additional layer of learning/remembering
- Great for vocabulary



Use the media album feature and allow students to upload photos related to terms or concepts.

DISCUSSIONS

- Start with a textual analysis question, a debatable topic, or other similar open-ended prompt
- Students post responses for the class to see
- Can also require that students constructively comment on other students' responses
 - 1. Use the discussion feature



- 2. Require students to post before seeing any of the responses
- 3. Assign for homework and highlight a few interesting responses during the following class

CONSTRUCTIVE QUIZZES

- Short quizzes that assess students' knowledge of the day's lesson
- Not formally graded
- Students receive instant feedback



- 1. Use the test/quiz feature and choose setting to allow students to see the correct answers once they have finished
- 2. Add explanations, so students have more than just the correct answer
